- Battery powered GSM auto dialler/mini alarm system ESIM4/ESIM4 Q (later referenced as "the system", "the device" or "ESIM4") is
 equipped with a radio transceiver operating in GSM900/1800 bands / GSM850/900/1800/1900 bands respectively.
- DO NOT use the system where it can cause potential danger and interfere with other devices such as medical devices.
- . DO NOT use the system in hazardous environment.
- DO NOT expose the system to high humidity, chemical environment or mechanical impact.
- DO NOT attempt to repair the system yourself any repairs must be carried out by fully qualified personnel only.



ESIM4 is a device that must be installed in limited access areas. Any system repairs must be done only by qualified, safety aware personnel.



Remove all batteries before installing. Never install or carry out maintenance during stormy weather.



The system must be powered by four 1,5 V lithium AA type batteries only. When inserting the batteries into the battery slots, mind the polarity terminals! Any additional device you connect to the system, such as a computer, must be powered by an EN 60950-1 approved supply.



To switch the system off, remove all four 1,5 V lithium AA type batteries.



Fuse F1 model - miniSMDC 0,5A. Replacement fuses have to be exactly the same as indicated by the manufacturer.



If you use a computer for the device configuration, it must be earthed.

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1. GENERAL INFORMATION

ESIM4 is a micro-controller based device used to inform users about the alarm in automatic or security systems, supply power to an auxiliary device and control one electrical appliance or measure temperature. The device can also be used as a mini-alarm system.

Examples of using the system:

- Suitable in areas without a 230V power supply.
- Switching one electronic device ON/OFF.
- Notification of failure or restoration of an electronic device via SMS text message and/or phone call.
- Property security.
- Temperature monitoring.
- · Lighting, garden watering, water pump and other electrical equipment control via SMS text messages.
- Remote listening to what is happening in the secured area.

Main features:

- Configuration by SMS text message and PC.
- Sleep mode for battery power saving for up to 2 years.
- Up to 10 users for system configuration, control and acceptance of system event notifications by SMS text messages and phone calls.
- 2 inputs on board turning to 4 inputs when ATZ mode enabled.
- Inputs Z1-Z4 customizable to NC or NO.
- Input Z1/Z3 modes: digital or analog.
- 1 AUX output operating in accordance with the set up period.
- Input Z2/Z4 modes: digital, temperature sensor or iButton key.
- · Mini-alarm system: arming/disarming by iButton key.
- Up to 8 temperature sensors support for temperature monitoring in different areas.
- 1 open-collector output for electrical appliance control.
- Built-in shock sensor for alarm/restore notification by SMS text message on vibration detection.
- Scheduled system operation in Wake-Up mode and on system event.
- Scheduled input alarm/restore notifications.
- Periodic self-test notification by SMS text message to user phone number.
- Customizable notification texts.
- OR code generator allowing to arrange a single or multiple text commands in a single SMS text message and encrypt it in a OR code.


General wiring




Temperature sensor wiring




iButton key reader and buzzer wiring

Output wiring





Example of input wiring in ATZ mode


3. INSTALLATION

For the connection of input/output terminals, use 0.50 mm²(0.02in²) 1 thread unshielded cable of up to 100m (328.08ft) length.

- 1. Wire up the system in accordance with the wiring diagrams (see 2.3 Wiring Diagrams for more details).
- 2. If necessary to run the wires, drill out a hole of 13mm (0.51in) diameter in the ESIM4 enclosure and insert the plastic gland supplied in ESIM4 package. The plastic gland must be facing down.








- The system comes with a GSM antenna that is already connected. If another type of GSM antenna is required, please replace the standard GSM antenna with an antenna of your choice.
- 4. When placing the system, follow the recommendations:





Never install in the following locations:


- · inside the metal cabinet
- closer than 20cm (7.87in) from the metal surface and/or power lines
- 5. Disable the PIN code request of the SIM card by inserting it into a mobile phone and following the proper menu steps.
- 6. Once the PIN code is disabled, insert the SIM card into the SIM card slot / holder of ESIM4 system.











- Insert all 4 batteries and wait until the LED indicator starts blinking indicating successful micro-controller operation. The system is now running in Wake-Up mode for 3 minutes to configure the system by SMS text messages (see 5. CONFIGURATION METHODS).
- 8. Change the default SMS password (see 6. SMS PASSWORD for more details).
- 9. Set the phone number for User 1 (see 7. USER PHONE NUMBERS for more details).
- 10. Once the LED indicator lights OFF, the system will switch to Sleep mode and it will no longer accept any SMS text messages.

ATTENTION: The system is NOT compatible with pure 3G SIM cards. Only 2G/GSM SIM cards and 3G SIM cards with 2G/GSM profile enabled are supported. For more details, please contact your GSM operator.

ATTENTION: We also recommend you to disable call forwarding, voice mail/text message reports on missed/busy calls and similar services that might cause incorrect system operation. Please contact your GSM operator for more details on these services and how to disable them.

NOTE: For maximum system reliability we recommend you do NOT use a Pay As You Go SIM card. Otherwise, in the event of insufficient credit balance on the SIM card, the system would fail to make a phone call or send SMS text messages.

NOTE: We advise you to choose the same GSM SIM provider for your system as for your mobile phone. This will ensure the fastest, most reliable SMS text message delivery service and phone call connection.

NOTE: Even though the installation process of ESIM4 is not too complicated, we still recommend to perform it by a person with basic knowledge in electrical engineering and electronics to avoid any system damage.

4.GENERAL OPERATIONAL DESCRIPTION

The battery powered GSM dialler ESIM4 uses the GSM network for event transmission by SMS text message and/or phone call to the listed user phone numbers. In addition to being informed about alarm and restore events of the inputs, the users can use the system to supply power to an auxiliary device and control one electrical appliance using an output or measure the temperature using up to 8 temperature sensors.

The system has two inputs (normally closed or normally open) for a detection device connection. By enabling the ATZ mode and connecting the resistors, 2 detection devices can be connected to each input. The system also supplies 12 volt power to an auxiliary device, such as, pressure sensor. In addition, the system comes equipped with a built-in shock sensor for any vibration detection where the system is placed.

ESIM4 can also be used as a mini alarm system supporting arming/disarming feature by iButton key.

ESIM4 can control 1 electrical appliance on receipt of the correct SMS text message or via *ELDES Configuration Tool* software. For example, users can turn on or off the heating, lighting, lift the gates, blinds etc.

By default, when an authorised number calls to the system, the device answers and the user can listen for 60 seconds to what is going on in the premises. This function works only when a microphone is connected. The system will ignore SMS requests and voice calls coming from unknown phone numbers.

Most of the time the system operates in Sleep mode allowing to save battery power for up to 2 years. However, when an event occurs, requiring the device to send SMS messages and/or dial one of the listed user phone numbers, the device will switch to Wake-Up mode.

5. CONFIGURATION METHODS

5.1. SMS Text Messages



!!! In this user manual the underscore character "_" represents one space character. Every underscore character must be replaced by a single space character. There must be no spaces or other unnecessary characters at the beginning and at the end of the SMS text message.



In order to configure and control the system by SMS text message, send the text command to the ESIM4 system phone number from one of the listed user phone numbers. The system supports multiple text commands arranged in a single SMS text message. The structure of SMS text message consists of 4-digit SMS password (the default SMS password is 0000 - four zeros), the parameter and value. For some parameters the value does not apply e. g. STATUS. The variables are indicated in lower-case letters, while a valid parameter value range is indicated in brackets.

For more details on how to encrypt an SMS text message in a QR code, please refer to **5.3. QR Codes** and *ELDES Configuration Tool* software's HELP section.

5.2. ELDES Configuration Tool



Software *ELDES Configuration Tool* is intended for ESIM4 battery powered GSM dialler configuration via USB port locally. This software simplifies system configuration process by allowing to use a personal computer in the process. Before starting to use *ELDES Configuration Tool* software, please read the user quide provided in the software's HELP section.

ELDES Configuration Tool is freeware and can be downloaded at: www.eldes.lt/download

NOTE: Configuration by USB cable and ELDES Configuration Tool software does not require the batteries to be inserted in the device.

5.3. QR Codes

For user convenience, *ELDES Configuration Tool* software comes equipped with QR code generator allowing to arrange a single or multiple text commands in a single SMS text message and encrypt it in a QR code. Once the QR code is generated, the user using his mobile phone's built-in camera can take a picture of the code right from his monitor's screen, then decrypt it to the SMS text message using his mobile phone's application and send the SMS text message to the system.

6.SMS PASSWORD

For security reasons, the system uses the following type of password:

SMS password - 4-digit password used for system configuration and control from user phone number by SMS text message. By default, SMS password is **0000**, which MUST be changed!

This operation may be carried out from the PC using the ELDES Configuration Tool software.

7. USER PHONE NUMBERS

The system supports up to 10 user phone numbers identified as User 1 through 10. When the phone number is set, the user will be able to configure the system by SMS text messages as well as to receive the alarm/restore phone calls and SMS text messages from the system (see 10.3. Alarm/Restore Notifications).

By default, the system accepts incoming calls and SMS text messages from any phone number. Once a user phone number is listed, the system ignores any incoming calls and SMS text messages from a non-listed phone number as well as it rejects the SMS text messages containing wrong SMS password even from a listed user phone number.

To set User 1 phone number is mandatory, while the other 9 are optional. The supported phone number formats are the following:

- International (with plus) The phone numbers must be entered starting with plus and an international country code in the following format: +[international code][area code][local number], example for UK: +44170911XXXX1.
- International (with 00) The phone numbers must be entered starting with 00 and an international country code in the following format: 00[international code][area code][local number], example for UK: 0044170911XXXX1.
- Local The phone numbers must be entered starting with an area code in the following format: [area code][local number], example
 for UK: 0170911XXXX1.


ATTENTION: NEVER add a phone number of the device's SIM card as a user phone number!

ATTENTION: Once User 1 phone number is set, it will be restricted to modify it only.

NOTE: Multiple user phone numbers can be set by a single SMS text message, e.g.: 1111_NR1:+4417091111111_NR2:+4417091111112_NR6:017091111113_NR10:+4417091111114

8.DATE AND TIME

The system comes equipped with internal real-time clock (RTC) that keeps track of the current date and time. Once the system is up and running, the user must set the correct date and time, otherwise the system will not operate properly. After shutting down and starting up the system, the date and time must be set again.



For more details on how to view system's information that may include date and time, please refer to **16. SYSTEM INFORMATION. STATUS SMS**.

8.1. Automatic Date and Time Synchronization

This feature enables the system to set the date and time automatically without the user being involved in this process. The system supports the following method of automatic date and time synchronization that is used whenever the system switches to Wake-Up mode:

• Via GSM network - Once enabled, the system automatically sends a date/time request to the GSM operator. This method is the most accurate synchronization method. Some GSM operators might not support it.

By default, synchronization via GSM network is disabled. To enable/disable automatic date and time synchronization via GSM network, please refer to the following configuration methods.

9. SLEEP AND WAKE-UP MODES

The system can operate in one of the following modes at a time:


- Wake-Up The micro-controller and the GSM modem are active and the system is ready to send and accept the SMS text messages and phone calls to/from the listed user phone number.
- Sleep The micro-controller and the GSM modem are disabled and the system will not be able to accept the SMS text messages or
 phone calls from the listed user phone number. Normally, this mode is used most of the system's uptime to significantly extend battery
 life

The system starts up in Wake-Up mode and operates in this mode for 3 minutes. When the 3-minute period expires, the system will switch to Sleep mode and operate in this mode until an event occurs or Wake-Up scheduler comes into effect (see **9.1. Wake-Up Scheduler**).

When an event occurs, the system will follow this pattern:

- 1) Switches to Wake-Up mode.
- 2) Notifies the user by SMS text message and/or phone call.
- 3) Stays in Wake-Up mode for 10 seconds.
- 4) Returns to Sleep mode.

By default, after notifying the user on a certain event, the system will stay in Wake-Up mode for 10 second time period. To set a different time period, please refer to the following configuration methods.



ATTENTION: All 4 batteries must be inserted in the device for the system to run in Wake-Up mode. If the system is connect to the PC only via USB cable, it will NEVER switch to Wake-Up mode.

NOTE: 0 value makes the system to instantly return to Sleep mode after notifying the user.

For more details on the system events and the algorithm of how the system sends the notifications, please refer to 17. SYSTEM NOTIFICATIONS.


9.1. Wake-Up Scheduler

The system comes equipped with 5 schedulers that allow to set up the periods of time in day for the system to operate in Wake-Up mode. Typically, this feature is used for device configuration via SMS text messages and/or receiving system status on request.

Each scheduler includes the following parameters:

- Status Determines whether the scheduler will apply or not.
- Start: Hour | Minutes Determines the point in time when the system switches to Wake-Up mode.
- End: Hour | Minutes Determines the point in time when the system switches back to Sleep mode.


By default, all schedulers are disabled and unset. To enable/disable and set up the schedulers, please refer to the following configuration methods.



10. INPUTS

The system comes equipped with 2 inputs identified as Z1 and Z2. Depending on the selected input mode, the inputs are designed for different detection device connection, such as pressure sensors, door contacts, temperature sensors etc. (see 10.1. Input Z1 and 10.2. Input Z2). Once the detection device is triggered, the system will switch to Wake-Up mode and send a notification to the user phone number (see 10.3. Alarm/Restore Notifications).

The ATZ (Advanced Technology Zone) mode is a software-based feature that doubles the number of inputs and enables two detection devices to be installed per 1 input terminal. Once this mode is enabled, it will result in additional input, identified as input Z3 (on input terminal Z1), and input Z4 (on input terminal Z2), appearance. The ATZ mode is supported by Digital input mode only. The detection devices must be wired to the input terminals as provided in **2.3. Wiring Diagrams**.




10.1. Input Z1

Input Z1 can operate in one of the following modes at a time:

- Digital The system monitors the input voltage resulting in the input state change. Normally, this mode is used for door contacts and
 other passive or active digital level sensors. This mode is set by default and it is compatible with ATZ mode. For more details on how to
 manage the Digital mode, please refer to 10.1.1. Digital Mode.
- Analog The system monitors the input current ranging resulting in the input state change. Typically, this mode is used for water-level sensors, pressure sensors and other analog level sensors. For more details on how to manage the Analog mode, please refer to 10.1.2. Analog Mode.


When active detection device is used, AUX output is required to power up the detection device. For more details, please refer to **10.1.3 AUX OUtput.**



10.1.1. Digital Mode

When Digital mode is set, the system follows this pattern:

- 1) Monitors input voltage ranging from 0 mV through 3000 mV every 1 second.
- 2) Verifies if the set up threshold (by default 1500 mV) is not exceeded.
- 3) By default, the input is set as NO (normally open), therefore if the voltage drops below the threshold, it will result in input state change to alarm followed by notifying the user by SMS text message and/or phone call.
- 4) When the voltage rises above the threshold, it will result in input state change to restore followed by notifying the user by SMS text message and/or phone call.



NOTE: If AUX output is used along with Digital input mode, the input voltage will be monitored in accordance with the set up period (by default - every 3600 seconds) (see 10.1.3. AUX Output).



10.1.2. Analog Mode

When Analog mode is set, the system follows this pattern:

- 1) Monitors input current ranging from 0 mA through 24 mA in accordance with the set up period (by default every 3600 seconds).
- Verifies if the set up threshold (by default 15 mA) is not exceeded.
- 3) If the current rises above the threshold, it will result in input state change to alarm followed by notifying the user by SMS text message and/or phone call.
- 4) When the current drops below the threshold, it will result in input state change to restore followed by notifying the user by SMS text message and/or phone call.



For more details on how to manage the alarm/restore notifications, please refer to 10.3. Alarm/Restore Notifications.

For more details on how to view system's information that may include input state, please refer to 16. SYSTEM INFORMATION. STATUS SMS.

10.1.3. AUX Output

The system comes equipped with AUX output that can supply power to auxiliary devices requiring 12 V, 200 mA max. DC. Typically, the AUX output is used for connecting active detection devices, such as pressure sensors.

By default, the AUX output is disabled. Once enabled, the system will follow this pattern:

- Powers up AUX output in accordance with the set up period (by default every 3600 seconds) for a set duration (by default 10 seconds).
- Once the duration expires, the system verifies if the set up threshold is not exceeded.
- If the threshold is exceeded, it will result in input state change followed by notifying the user by SMS text message and/or phone call regarding input alarm/restore.

10.2. Input Z2

Input Z2 can operate in one of the following modes at a time:

- Digital The system monitors the input voltage resulting in the input state change. Normally, this mode is used for door contacts and
 other passive digital level sensors. This mode is set by default and it is compatible with ATZ mode. For more details on how to manage
 the Digital mode, please refer to 10.2.1. Digital Mode.
- Temperature Sensor The input converts to 1-Wire interface for temperature sensor connection. For more details on how to manage the Temperature Sensor mode, please refer to 10.2.2. Temperature Sensor Mode.
- iButton key The input converts to 1-Wire interface for iButton key and buzzer connection. For more details on how to manage the iButton keys, please refer to 10.2.3. iButton Key Mode.

ESIM4 system supports up to 8 iButton keys each holding a unique identity code (ID), which is used for system arming and disarming (see **15. ARMING AND DISARMING**).

For more details on how to wire the iButton key reader, please refer to 2.3. Wiring Diagrams.

10 3 Alarm/Restore Notifications

In the event of input alarm or restore, the system can notify the listed user phone number by the following methods that can be used individually or simultaneously:

- SMS text message.

The system supports input alarm/restore notification delivery restriction feature by time. For more details, please refer to to 12. ALARM/RESTORE NOTIFICATION SCHEDULER.



By default, in the event of input alarm or restore, the system will follow this pattern:

- The system attempts to send an SMS text message containing input alarm/restore text to the first listed user phone number only.
- 2) If the user phone number is unavailable and the system fails to receive the SMS delivery report within 45 seconds, it will attempt to send the SMS text message to the next listed user phone number. The system may fail to deliver the SMS text message to the listed user phone number due to the following reasons:
 - user's mobile phone has been switched off.
 - user's mobile phone has been out of GSM signal coverage.
 - · alarm/restore notification scheduler has not yet come into effect, if enabled.
- 3) The system will continue sending the SMS text message to the next listed user phone numbers in the priority order until one is available. The system sends the SMS text message only once and will not return to the first user phone number if the last one was unavailable.
- 4) If the system ends up with all unsuccessful attempts, it will queue up the event in the event memory and attempt to send all the queued up events by SMS text message to the listed user phone number in accordance with the set up period and number of attempts (see **18. EVENT MEMORY**).

 - mobile phone has been switched off.
 - mobile phone has been out of GSM signal coverage.
 - has provided "busy" signal.
 - user did not answer the call after several rings, predetermined by the GSM operator.
- 4) The system will continue dialing the next listed user phone numbers in the priority order until one is available.
- 5) The system dials only once and will not return to the first user phone number if the last one was unavailable. The system will not dial the next listed user phone number if the previous one was available, but rejected the phone call.

NOTE: Violated input number indication by short beeps apply to input Z1 and input Z2 only.

10.3.1. Alarm Delay

The system comes equipped with alarm/restore notification delay feature allowing to limit alarm and restore notification delivery to the listed user phone number within a specified time-frame.

By default, the alarm delay feature is disabled. Once a delay period is set up for a certain input or shock sensor, by violating/restoring the input or shock sensor after arming the system and/or on the first system run, the system will instantly transmit a notification to the listed user phone number. The system will ignore a repeated violation of the same input/shock sensor while the delay period is in progress. Once the delay period has expired, the input/shock sensor violation will lead to notification delivery to the listed user phone number.

11. SHOCK SENSOR

ESIM4 has a built-in shock sensor that detects the surface vibrations of the location where the device is installed. This feature allows to receive the alarm/restore notifications by SMS text message to the listed user phone number in accordance with the number of set up shakes in a certain time period (by default - for alarm event: more than 10 shakes in 15 seconds; for restore event: up to 30 shakes in 40 seconds).

The system supports shock sensor alarm/restore notification delivery restriction feature by time. For more details, please refer to to 12. ALARM/RESTORE NOTIFICATION SCHEDULER.

By default, the shock sensor is disabled. To enable/disable the shock sensor, set a different number of shakes, time period, manage alarm/restore SMS text messages and manage alarm delay duration, please refer to the following configuration methods.

- Status Determines whether the scheduler will apply or not. Once enabled, the system will be able to deliver input alarm/restore
 notifications only when the scheduler comes into effect.
- Start: Hour | Minutes Determines the point in time when the system is permitted to deliver alarm/restore notifications.
- End: Hour | Minutes Determines the point in time when the system is denied to deliver alarm/restore notifications.

By default, the scheduler is disabled and unset. To enable/disable and set up the scheduler, please refer to the following configuration methods.

13. OUTPUT

The system comes equipped with 1 open collector output C1 designed for electrical appliance connection. Normally, the output can be used to open/close garage doors, activate lights, heating, watering and much more. When a output turns ON, the system triggers any device or relay connected to it.



To instantly arm or disarm the system, touch the iButton key reader by any of 8 available iButton keys. By default, when the iButton key is touched to the iButton key reader, the buzzer (see 13. OUTPUT) will emit short beeps followed by SMS text message notification ARMING or DISARMING respectively. The notification will be simultaneously delivered to all listed user phone numbers that are enabled to receive arm and/or disarm notifications.



To modify the content of the notification, manage the arm or disarm notification delivery for a certain listed user phone number and disable or enable the buzzer, please refer to the following configuration methods.




16. SYSTEM INFORMATION, STATUS SMS

The system supports an informational SMS text message identified as the Status SMS, which can be delivered upon request. Once requested, the system will reply with Status SMS that may provide the following:

- System name.
- System date & time.
- Battery level.
- GSM signal strength.
- System's internal temperature
- Name and status (ON/OFF) of the output.
- Input state/value

16.1. Periodic Status SMS

Once enabled, the system sends Status SMS to listed user phone number periodically every 1 hour. Typically, this feature is used to verify the online status of the system.

By default, periodic Status SMS is disabled. To enable/disable periodic Status SMS and/or set a different frequency, please refer to the following configuration methods.



ATTENTION: Before using periodic Status SMS, please set the correct system date and time (see 8, DATE AND TIME). Otherwise, the system will send this SMS text message at the wrong time.

17. SYSTEM NOTIFICATIONS



When an event occurs, the system will follow this pattern:

- a) The system attempts to send an SMS text message to the first listed user phone number only.
- b) If the user phone number is unavailable and the system fails to receive the SMS delivery report within 45 seconds, it will attempt to send the SMS text message to the next listed user phone number. The user phone number may be unavailable due to the following reasons:
 - · mobile phone has been switched off.
 - mobile phone has been out of GSM signal coverage.
- c) The system will continue sending the SMS text message to the next listed user phone numbers in the priority order until one is available. The system sends the SMS text message only once and will not return to the first user phone number if the last one was unavailable.
- d) If the system ends up with all unsuccessful attempts, it will queue up the event in the event memory and attempt to send all the queued up events by SMS text message to the listed user phone number in accordance with the set up period and number of attempts (see 18. EVENT MEMORY).

The following table provides the description of available system notifications sent to the user phone number by SMS text message.

18. EVENT MEMORY

The system comes equipped with event memory that can hold up to 16 events. The event memory is of LIFO (last in, first out) type that allows the system to automatically overwrite the oldest events with the latest ones.

The event will queue up in the event memory if the system ends up with all unsuccessful attempts to deliver the SMS text message to the listed user phone number. The system will attempt to re-transmit all queued up events in accordance with the set up period (by default - every 10 minutes) and number of attempts (by default - 5 attempts).

By default, event memory is disabled. To enable/disable, clear the event memory or set a different re-transmission period and/or number of attempts, please refer to the following configuration method.


19. REMOTE LISTENING

ESIM4 may be equipped with a microphone that allows the user to listen on his mobile phone to what is happening in the area surrounding the microphone. Remote listening feature can operate under the following conditions:

- The system makes a phone call to a listed user phone number in case of input alarm/restore and the user answers the call (see also 10.3. Alarm/Restore Notifications).
- The user dials the system phone number and the system answers the call.

In both cases, the "conversation" will last for up to 60 seconds until the system automatically hangs up.

By default, when the listed user dials the system phone number, the system automatically answers the call. This feature is identified as Answer Call. To disable, enable the Answer Call feature and set a different microphone gain (by default - 12), please refer to the following configuration methods.

20.2. Restoring Default Parameters

- 1. Remove all 4 batteries.
- 2. Press and hold the DEF button.
- 3. Connect the device via USB cable to the PC.
- 4. Wait until the LED indicator quickly flashes several times.
- 5. Release the DEF button.
- 6. Parameters restored to default.

20.3. Updating the Firmware via USB Cable

- 1. Remove all 4 batteries.
- 2. Short circuit (connect) FW pins.
- 3. Connect the device via USB cable to the PC.
- 4. The new window must pop-up where you will find the .bin file. Otherwise open My Computer and look for CRP DISABLED drive.
- 5. Delete the .bin file found in the drive.
- 6. Copy the new firmware .bin file to the very same window.
- 7. Unplug USB cable.
- 8. Remove short circuit from FW pins.
- 9. Firmware updated.

NOTE: It is strongly recommended to restore default parameters after the firmware update.
